The Top 10 Fake News Articles on ... - Social Media News

The lower part of the graph presents web traffic sources for a list of 65 major fake news sites, which we gathered from lists

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compiled by Zimdars (2016) and Brayton (2016). For the top news sites, social media referrals represent only about 10 percent of total traffic. By contrast, fake news websites rely on social.
